

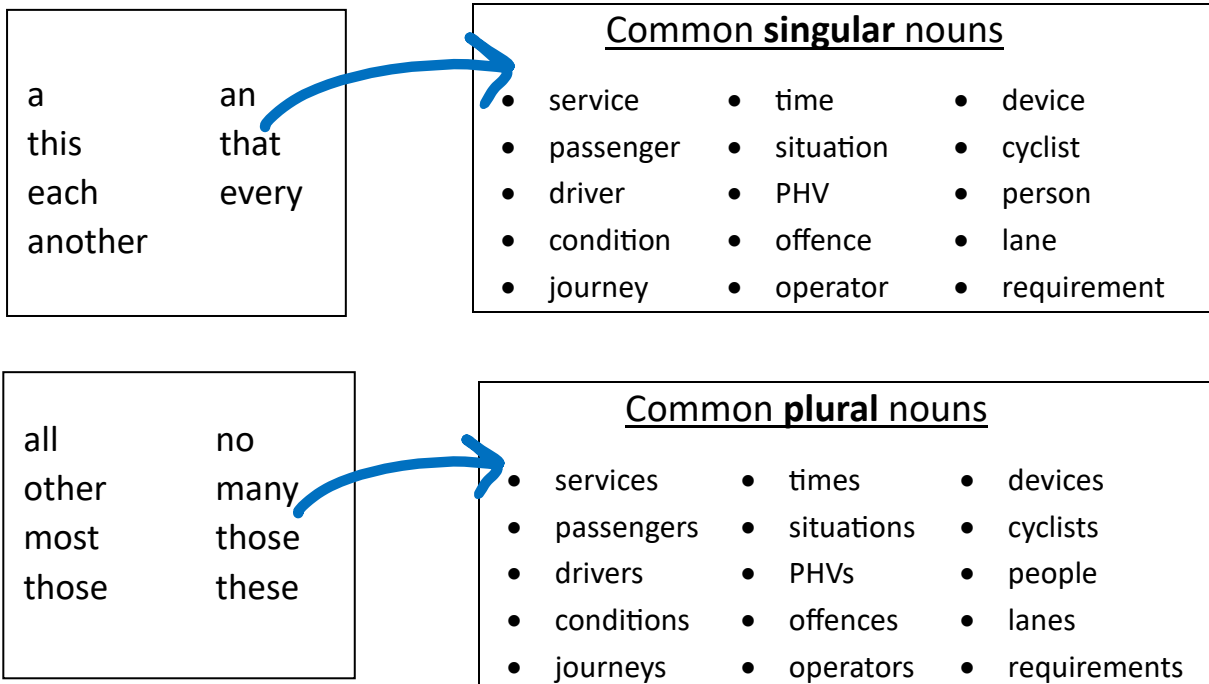
CHEAT SHEET – Singular vs Plural Nouns

When to use a plural/singular noun

A noun is a thing, object, or person.

A noun can be singular (*driver, person*) or plural (*drivers, people*)

- Always use a singular noun if one of these **determiners** come before:
a / an / another / this / that / each / every
- Always use a plural noun if one of these **determiners** come before.
all / no / other / many / most / those / these
- In other cases, decide from the meaning of the text
the / some / any / (no determiner)



Common nouns in their singular and plural forms

all
other
most
those
some

no
many
those
these

a safe and reliable *service*

provide insurance details to **a** *passenger*

arranging for **another** *driver*

you develop **a** new medical *condition*

Before the start of **each** *journey*

Every *PHV* must have

you may be committing **an** *offence*

a booking from **an** unlicensed *operator*

each *time* they apply

If you are in **this** *situation*

Consider using **a** lone worker *device*

If **a** *cyclist* is using the middle

discriminates against **any** *person*

enter and leave the bus *lane*

you should know about **this** *requirement*

passenger transport *services*

we know that **some** *passengers*

This applies to **all** *PHV drivers*

Any *conditions* added to your licence

All *ridesharing journeys*

PHVs play an important role

any *offences* you have committed

charged by *PHV operators*

wear this badge at **all** *times*

In **most** *situations*

that **no** *devices* or signage reduce or obstruct

Be aware of *cyclists*

allows **many** *people* to live

In **most** *bus lanes*

you should know about **these** *requirements*
